Yet, the whole incident was ironical. I must thank Mr. Tarapore for making me twice as determined to be a good fast bowler. I have never forgotten that taunting tone of his. "There are no fast bowlers in India.

This problem of finding the right diet was to come up again soon in my life. And how differently my family handled it! My first coach, Mr. Desh Prem Azad, had come home once and informed my parents that I had the potential to be a pace bowler and that more care should be paid towards my diet. He recommended that I should drink a lot of milk and eat a lot of butter and down other dairy products in order to gain physical strength. My father went out the next day and bought a buffalo.

This was encouragement of the highest order. That buffalo was tied in the backyard of our timber shop and there was not a day in my early life when an extra glass of milk was not available when I needed it. Such a gesture, coming from a man who knew nothing about sports, was indeed touching. The more I think of my father these days the more I admire him and respect him for what he did for me and how readily he did it. For a reasonably wealthy man one buffalo might not have meant much but to take the trouble to go and buy one and 'park' it needed nobility of character and I am proud to say my father had that quality.

My brothers encouraged me a great deal too. They knew what cricket was. Romesh had studied only up to Matriculation before joining the family business. He had played some sports in his life but his heroes had been wrestlers. I don't mean it as a disrespect to him but I mention it only to bring out what Chandigarh was like in those days. It was still only a little more than a village.

It was Bhushan who represented the university in football and cricket and, in fact, led the cricket team too. He believed in giving the ball a whack or two and in our area he was a hero – the batsman who loved to hit the ball. And I can tell you he was fairly consistent too. He had much to do with shaping my attitudes to cricket and particularly to batting.

Bhushan too went into the family business after getting a degree in law.

What I appreciated most in my two brothers was the selfless way in which they encouraged me to pursue my goals in cricket. They always said to me – 'You go ahead and play as long as you want to and we will look after the family business'. That was really nice of them. And we have always been a closely knit family. After all, to both of them, I was not Kapil Dev the cricket superstar but just Kapil, their kid brother.

Like Celine Dion's Academy Award-winning Titanic theme song, 'My Heart Will Go On', the mystery around what led to the sinking of the superliner on April 14, 1912, it seems, will continue forever. So in the 100th year of the incident, we have yet another theory bobbing about the surface. To recount the old official tale, RMS Titanic was on its way from Southampton to New York when it struck an iceberg just off the coast of Newfoundland. The glancing blow hit the 100-metre long starboard section of the hull and water rushed inside its six (supposedly watertight) compartments. Within the next three hours, the ship went down.

But not many bought this theory and a legion of stories about the legend began to come out. The latest has been floated by science writer Richard Corfield who says that the rivets that held the ship's hull together were not even in composition or quality and gave way when the ship hit the iceberg. A quick Web search, however, reveals that the fascinating thing called the human mind is capable of much more; while one pinned the accident down to a fire inside the ship's coal bunkers, another one talked about the curse of the pharaohs since a traveller had with him a sarcophagus containing the mummy of an ancient Egyptian priestess. Other than these glamorous theories, there are the ordinary ones: the helmsman making a steering blunder and the ship moving too fast to win the Blue Riband, a prestigious prize awarded to a ship for making the fastest North Atlantic crossing.

So what makes the Titanic story tick? From the very beginning, its story was tailor-made to be a riveting copy. Investigating it made good business too: from books, to research grants to underwater expeditions, not to mention a mega budget movie. In other words, the Titanic story has been done to death. May be the 100th year is a good time to leave the ship in its watery grave once and for all.
